Dear Parents,

#### Parents' Evening

We hope that you appreciated the time with your child's class teacher at parents evening last week and understand the reasons for our reminders and chasing of parents to sign up for this. It is well known that engagement with your child's learning is crucial to their success at school which spurs us on to connect with you in any way we can. Our 'Meet the New Teacher' event, Parents Evening and soon to come SEND Parents Evening are all ways that we endeavour to do this.

#### Compassion

Over recent weeks we have been thinking about the value of compassion. Together we have been learning ways to show compassion which include:

- Caring for yourself and your body inside and out;
- Being kind and gentle;
- Understanding the difficulties others face;
- Caring for the Earth and the environment by being mindful and not wasteful about what we use and how we throw things away.

- Say sorry if you've done something wrong
- Ask someone if they need help
- Let someone go in front of you in the line
- Smile at someone

These small acts all help us live well together and we hope these have been extended home!

#### **Maths County Visit**

This term we had two very important visitors from the local authority to observe the teaching and learning in maths. They watched lessons, spoke with many children and looked at books during their time with us. They were very impressed with the improvements the school has made in this curriculum area and we were delighted with the feedback they gave us.

You may have noticed the works around our Woodland Walk area. This is all down to the generosity of Balfour Beatty who approached many schools in the area to offer the helping hand of works on their grounds. # Svimming

Swimming lessons are provided in our heated outdoor pool between April and October and lead by Coach Sue & Coach Sam - both qualified swimming instructors.

Children learn to stay safe in and around the water. They are taught in small class groups and learn a variety of techniques from star floats and mushroom floats, through to tumble turns and sculling. Most of the children have been swimming lengths within their lessons and all have shown great progress and confidence in the water. The bulk



of the swimming lessons are based on confidence building and technique and each lesson is adapted to the age and ability of the children within the lesson.



This term, Years 2 & 3 have been focusing on front crawl and back stroke, while Years 4,5 & 6 have been developing stamina and stroke technique across all four strokes. We've even included timed swims so the children can compete against the clock, this is always exciting and it's lovely to hear the children support and encourage each other with this activity. Swimming is not all hard work though and the children have also participated in relay races, obstacle courses and dodge ball.

Please ask your child about the swimming lessons they've received.

The Governors and Senior Leadership Team would like to thank all of those parents who have contributed to keep the pool operational.

If you haven't already, it is not too late to make your contribution.

RCS Community Pantry Earlier this year, RCS opened a Community Pantry in the Cable Works Building in Eastleigh. The Pantry initiative is designed to support people with food deprivation, helping them to escape or move on from their current emergency with a 'helping hand' approach. Each week there is a weekly meal deal provided with a recipe to help everyone have a wholesome meal. Each member will be able to do a weekly shop at a small recommended donation charge of £5 per visit and receive a minimum of £15 worth of food. #### **Attendance Corner**

#### Why is high attendance important to my child's education?

As a parent/carer you want the best for your children. Having a good education is an important factor in opening up more opportunities in adult life. Did you know that:

- a child who is absent a day of school per week misses an equivalent of two years of their school life
- 90% of young people with absence rates below 85% fail to achieve five or more good grades of GCSE and around one third achieve no GCSEs at all
- poor examination results limit young people's options and poor attendance suggests to colleges and employers that these students are unreliable
- poor school attendance is also closely associated with crime: a quarter of school age offenders have truanted repeatedly
- at least 1 million children take at least one half day off a year without permission
- 7.5 million school days are missed each year through unauthorised absence

It is essential that we all work together to ensure your child attends school punctually and regularly, so that they have access to their full entitlement of education.

Persistent lateness, or lateness after the close of register (U code) which reaches a threshold deemed unacceptable may also result in the issuing of a Penalty Notice, so it is vital that your child is in class by 845am every day please.

#### Absence from School

If your child will not be in school, please ensure that our school office is notified by 9.00am at the latest on each day of absence. This is to ensure that we know where your child is and that they are safe. It is our procedure to send a text message and an email to ensure that we know a child's whereabouts if they are not in school. If we do not receive a reason for the absence then we will record this as unauthorised, using code O. If a child is absent for 3 days without contact, or if we are concerned about a child's safety, then we will attempt phone contact with all contact numbers held on file. If we have not made contact with an adult who can confirm the child's

whereabouts and safety on this 3rd day, then we may take further action to ensure a

child's safety, this may include visiting your home or in circumstances of extreme concern, requesting the police to make a welfare visit. This procedure is in light of serious incidents throughout the country where schools have not taken safeguarding seriously enough when children are absent from school.

#### Whole School Attendance

As a school, we aim for children's attendance to be 100%, however we do understand that sometimes children are unwell and need time at home to recover, therefore our target for attendance is 96% - this is referred to as Green Band Attendance.

Currently as a whole school, we have dropped below this and at the time of writing our whole Attendance Bands

Green - 96% - 100% No Risk

Amber - 93% - 95.9% Risk of under-achievement

Pink - 90% - 92.9% Serious risk of under-achievement

Red - 0% - 89.9% Severe risk & possible legal intervention

school attendance is just 95.9% - this is in the Amber Band.



As you will undoubtably agree, this generation of children have missed more than enough school recently due to the Covid19 Pandemic, and it is therefore vital that your child attends school, on time, every day, unless they are genuinely unwell.



If you are aware of any circumstances that are causing a problem with attendance, please do give the school a call. We would welcome the opportunity to work with both you and your child to improve the situation.



## EYFS Autumn Learning

The EYFS children have made a fantastic start to their time at Nightingale; developing new friendships and participating in lots of new learning.

In phonics the children have been learning important pre-reading and writing skills through lots of engaging games and activities. They have now started to learn their Read Write Inc set 1 sounds, and are learning to sound out and blend to read and build simple words using their magnetic boards and letter tiles. We have been really impressed with the children's effort and enthusiasm during our phonics sessions and with learning their red words at home well done Kingfishers and Woodpeckers!

The children have been working hard to be independent in their changing for PE and are beginning to get themselves dressed and undressed with more confidence; remembering to put all of their belongings neatly back into their bags. PE lessons have been lots of fun and the children have shown great listening skills when following instructions. Kingfishers have been very lucky to have Coach Jake working with them this half term and the Woodpeckers are very excited for their turn after the half term break.

The children have been enjoying our Autumn inspired learning this half term and have spent time observing the changes to the world around us. We've had lots of fun in the woodland collecting conkers, testing out how sycamore seeds travel and working collaboratively to build dens!

We would like to say a big well done and thank you to the EYFS children and families for such a super start to the school year!



The children have transitioned into their new classes seamlessly and have already impressed us with their positive attitudes and behaviour for learning, their thirst for learning, their curiosity, their creativity and their kindness.

So far this term, the children have had the opportunity to reconnect and start new friendships. They have quickly adapted to the new rules and routines in school and have been regularly praised for their behaviour, particularly their 'fantastic walking' around the school.

We have been fortunate with the weather, which has enabled us to continue to offer the children learning opportunities both inside and outside.

The children have spent their first few weeks in Year I recapping phonics sounds taught to them in Year R to ensure they are ready for the new sounds we will be learning moving forwards. We have also read and used some fantastic stories such as 'We're all welcome here', 'Super Duper You!', 'Once there were Giants' and 'Funnybones' to inspire us with some wonderful writing this half term.

In Maths we have been focussing on place value. This has included making numbers using different counting objects, practising our number formation, exploring I more and I less and ordering numbers.

We have really enjoyed our swimming lessons and our confidence has been growing. We have also been learning skills to play Basketball with Coach Jake.

Our main topic this half term has been learning all about Myths and Legends. At the beginning of the

The children have been enjoying learning lots of new musical terminology.






## Year 5

Year 5 have worked extremely hard over the past half term and have settled back into school brilliantly. We have had them really focused to ensure that we are covering any areas in Maths, English and Reading that needed bridging between Year 4 and 5, as well as ensuring we are setting a higher standard of presentation as is expected from Upper KS2. We have become firmly entrenched in our Ancient Greeks topic, using a wonderful book



called Mythologica to help generate some information texts about the Greek gods and goddesses and the soon to be completed shields in Art and Science. We have, most recently, been using the story of Theseus and the Minotaur to help the children generate some powerful story extracts. In Maths, the children have been revising and building on their existing place value knowledge before doing some extended work on the four operations.

In science we have been thinking about how light travels and how it is affected when it meets different types of materials; children have also looked at how the eye sees light and will use some of this knowledge to help create the reflective surface of their shields. In History and Geography, we have looked at how the Ancient Greek civilisation has affected our society today and at how both Ancient and modern-day Greek life have been influenced by its climate and position within the world.





This half term it has been Year 5's turn to have Enrichment afternoons. All children have had the opportunity to cook and take part in the dance sessions from Intrar8.



The children have greatly enjoyed their swimming lessons and have been working hard on embedding the skills learnt in the Summer Term. Lessons with Coach Jake have been focused around basketball skills, it has been wonderful to see the confidence and skills sets of all children improve over the weeks. Many of our Year 5s were very excited to try out for the football and netball teams; those that were unsuccessful this year will obviously have chance to try out again next year when they become Year 6.

## Year 6

What a brilliant start to the new academic year! Autumn Term has started so well and the children are working incredibly hard. They've settled in fantastically and are showing fantastic attitudes for and behaviours for learning. We can't wait to see what the rest of the year has to bring!





#### Chinese Hook Day

To start the year off, we took part in a Chinese Hook Day when we learned new skills about China and the innovations that have emerged from this country throughout history. The children learned about Chinese calligraphy and that this was one of the earliest forms of writing recorded. They also created their own pellet drums — musical instruments originated in China. They also practised using chopsticks and made lanterns too.









Swimming

The children have thoroughly enjoyed their weekly

swimming lessons with Sam and Sue. They have shown

increased confidence in the water, greater

understanding of the strokes and increased stamina

#### SATs Papers

The children worked so hard to complete their first mock SATs papers. They have completed a SPaG paper, reading paper and 3 Maths papers. They've shown great resilience, independence and perseverance. Well done everyone!











#### Scientific Enquiry

The children became immersed in a scientific learning journey that saw them take on the role of secret agents. They had to overcome challenges and obstacles, using their understanding of forces which oppose motion ending with them recovering a stolen Dragon scroll. They built their own streamlined boats to travel down the Huangpu River, designed and created parachutes to investigate air resistance, tested a variety of materials to determine the suitability of the tread of boots (friction) and finally created pulley systems to learn that larger objects need a great force to move them.

### Brecon Residential

In September, 56 of the Year 6 children headed off to the Brecon Beacons in Wales for their residential. The children thrived and showed great determination in all of the activities they took part in; caving, waterfall walking, canoeing and mountain walking. They had such a great week!

#### Caving

The children travelled to the Porth yr Ogof Caves and braved lots of challenges including: the Letterbox, the White Line Crawl and the Army Crawl. This activity definitely took huge amounts of perseverance and bravery, but the children all did so well and felt a great sense of achievement at the end.













#### Mountain Walking

This was definitely the most tiring of the activities but all children made it to the top of Corn Du and Pen y Fan (the tallest peak in the South of Britain). Well done everyone!



#### Waterfall Walk

After caving, the groups travelled to the nearby river. Here, they navigated the river, working their way towards the waterfall at the top. On arriving at the waterfall, the children were able to swim in the pool and slide down the waterfall. Great fun had by all!

#### Canoeing


During this activity, the children worked in pairs to navigate the Brecon canal.

Cheyenne participated in the Race for Life.








#### **WELCOME BACK**
